#### **HELLOS AND GOODBYES**

In the past three months, we have received 6 children, 3 have been re-united with their families, and 2 have been fostered.

#### **ADMISSIONS**

Josephine Namakula (3 years) arrived on 11<sup>th</sup> April 2016; She was abandoned in the house together with her other two sisters of 10 years and 6 months, by an allegedly lunatic mother in Bukoto- Kampala District. Area residents after hearing the youngest child crying for several days got concerned and intervened and realized they lived alone in the house. This case was then reported to Kira Road Police Station.

**Joan Birungi** (6 months old) arrived on 11<sup>th</sup> April 2016; She was abandoned in the house together with her other two sisters of 3 and 10 years by an allegedly lunatic mother in Bukoto- Kampala District. Area residents got concerned and intervened and reported the matter to Kira Road Police Station.

**Hosea John Baptist Owomugisha** (4 months old) arrived on 12<sup>th</sup> April 2016; He was found abandoned by an unknown person in Kebisoni Trading Centre, Rukungiri District. This matter was reported to Rukungiri Police station and later the child was transferred to Sanyu Babies' Home for care and protection.



**Ethan Kato** (1 week old) arrived on 17<sup>th</sup> May 2016; Ethan together with his twin sister lost their mother just after their delivery in Gomba Hospital. They were referred under our custody by the District Probation and Social Welfare Officer for reasons regarding their status and their father's health and condition.

**Maureen Babirye** (1 week old) arrived on 17<sup>th</sup> May 2016; Maureen together with her twin brother lost their mother just after their delivery in Gomba Hospital. They were referred under our custody by the District Probation and Social Welfare Officer for reasons regarding their status and their father's health and condition.



**Elijah Mwanje** (1 day old) arrived on 15<sup>th</sup> June 2016; He was abandoned by his mother in Kabale clinic Nakulabye just after delivery past 11:00pm. The Good Samaritan nurse reported this matter to Old Kampala Police Station the following day.

He is HIV positive and at first he did not respond to medication well and had to be admitted to hospital but now he is responding to his medication well and is a much healthier child. Since being at Sanyu Babies' Home, he has grown much stronger and enjoys eating and taking porridge and milk. He goes to baby class every weekday morning where he enjoys playing with toys and singing songs and is walking around everywhere now. He enjoys playing down by the sandpit and going on the roundabout and slide with the other children. He also likes having cuddles off the Mamas and volunteers.

# **UPDATE: Hope Kwagala Reunited**



In the June 2014, you may have read about the story of Hope Kwagala. She arrived at Sanyu aged 6 days old, and weighing only 1.6kg. She spent the first 6 days of her life under incubator special care and was then brought to Sanyu Babies Home for care and protection. She was conceived as a result of rape on a young girl. The young girl had mental health problems and stayed with her very old grandfather who could not take on the care of the both of them. During the first few months of her life she encountered several complications with her health. It was discovered that Hope had an umbilical hernia that needed surgery immediately even though she was still very young. She

recovered from this surgery successfully however she then contracted pneumonia so had to be hospitalized again. Due to all the love and care Hope has been shown by the Mamas, Nurses, volunteers and all the staff here at Sanyu Babies Home, Hope has flourished into a very happy child. She is walking, starting to talk and is

part of play class. She enjoys playing, singing songs and spending time with other children, staff and volunteers. There is some very sad news as her Grandfather aged 96 had a bad fall earlier this year and very sadly passed away in May of this year.

However, there is also some very good news for Hope! The social workers at Sanyu Babies Home have been working hard to try and find some other family to look after Hope and her teenage mother. They found a relative that would like to help and bring up Hope and care and love for her! The relative is the sister of Hope's teenage mother's mother. Hope has grown up such a lot and has learnt so much whilst being here at Sanyu Babies Home, but now the



time has come for her to be reunited with her family and start the next chapter of her life!

We thank CRANE partnering with Viva for donating to us a startup pack for Hope which included items but not limited to; a mattress, blanket, mosquito net, bed sheets, shoes, tooth brush and a towel.

We pray that God keeps on blessing Hope and her family as they embark on a new life together. The two pictures show Hope firstly when she arrived in Sanyu Babies Home as a tiny baby and the other when she left to go home with her grandmother and aunt.

# Service without Boundaries- Cheryl Pazia and Muriel DeLong



We are a couple of fifty-something women from Canada who have had the privilege of volunteering at Sanyu Babies' Home – twice!

Having worked together as pediatric nurses for several years, our lives diverged in different directions. Cheryl, married with a grown daughter, is now working as an educator in a day care. Muriel's nursing career has taken her to the New Brunswick Extra-Mural Program providing home health service.

Having spoken to each of us separately, God instilled in both of us the desire to serve Him by caring for orphans. A telephone conversation in August of 2014 resulted in us spending a month at Sanyu in early 2015.

That month was bittersweet as we encountered incredible joy colliding head on with tremendous heartbreak. However, after returning home we realized we had left a piece of our hearts tucked in a little corner of Kampala, Uganda.

Sanyu is a place filled with laughter and tears and the singing of children. A place where every day we heard a hundred "ellos". A place where we snuggled, played with and comforted the precious little ones God placed in our path. A place where we were hugged and kissed (and occasionally bitten and spat upon) readily by children, like any other, wanting to be loved and to belong.

Back in Canada we never stopped telling the Sanyu story. We had many opportunities to share about children like Joselyn and Bosco, Florence and Kkonde - children who had been rescued from appalling situations but were being lovingly cared for and nurtured by the amazing Sanyu staff. And we shared about the staff and administration themselves whose dedication, faith, joy and vision are an inspiration.

Those who heard the Sanyu story were also inspired. They were inspired to encourage and pray for us. They were inspired to give clothing and other needs for the children. And they were inspired to give financially to enable us to return in April of this year to spend another month helping to care for the children and renewing relationships with them and the staff.

The generosity of donors was so great, we had the joy of working with Barbara (and seeing how she can get the



most out of every shilling) to determine how best to use the abundance of donation money we had received, to assist Sanyu. It was a humbling privilege to spend God's money on purchases and projects to help improve the lives and the environment of those living and working in this place that has become so precious to us.

A piece of our hearts remains tucked in that little corner of Kampala. We feel blessed to have been welcomed into the Sanyu family. We shall continue to share the Sanyu story. And maybe, just maybe, God's path will lead us back again someday.


# TRIPS- Fun and much more Fun!

# Hand Hygiene and Health Awareness at Sanyu

#### **Hand Sanitization**

Around April/May time, some of the children started to develop an unusual skin condition that was causing them lots of pain. Due to the amount of time the children spend playing together, using the same toys and living in close proximity of one another, the skin condition was passed between the children quickly and many were affected. This highlighted the need for good hygiene in particular the use of good hand hygiene. A company called Saraya East Africa who are hand wash specialists, came to the home and gave the Mamas and Nurses instructions on hand washing and hand hygiene, to help increase their knowledge and also reinforce what they already knew and did. They talked about the important of hand washing and what it can help prevent and who it can protect.



They talked about the hand washing procedure and then each of the Mama's had a go at this themselves. Then they talked about the benefits of hand sanitizer/disinfectant, about the product itself and how to use it. Elsewhere in this newsletter you will read about two Canadian volunteers called Cheryl and Muriel, who donated money and bought several hand sanitizer stations that were then set up in various places around the home. A hand wash specialist came and helped with this installation of these sanitizer dispensers.





## **Hepatitis & Yellow Fever Awareness**

Recently a group from International Medical Centre (IMC), came to Sanyu Babies' Home to help to educate the staff at the home about the disease Hepatitis and also Yellow Fever. They informed the Mamas and Nurses and the rest of the staff all about the dangers of the two diseases and ways of preventing infection. Before the talk, many of the Mamas didn't know much about Hepatitis and Yellow Fever. Most of the emphasis of the talk was

put on Hepatitis although they learnt about Yellow Fever too. At the end of the talk the Mamas and staff shared their worries with Barbara particularly relating to hepatitis, as often children will arrive at the home and nothing will be known about their backgrounds or what disease or illnesses they carry. This puts the staff and other children in quite a vulnerable position. Barbara did her best to reassure them however, ultimately it would be wonderful to vaccinate all the Mama's and the children that come to live at the home as it would mean that everyone would be safe. This would be a very costly process though, as each dose of the vaccination would cost 50,000 UGX and each child or Mama would require three doses. This is a project that the home is wishing to pursue so if you feel you are able to donate to this process please contact Barbara and she will help you further with this.

# Sanyu: Where age makes no difference.

**Janice Smith** came to volunteer for six months. She's 71 ½ and comes all the way from Queensland, Australia.

She says, "When in Sunday School as a child, I was shown pictures of malnourished African children and the seed was planted. On my 70<sup>th</sup> birthday the seed took root in my heart and began to blossom. I knew God wanted me to do many things and it was now or never. After spending 10 months doing missions in Zambia she took a small break to see her three daughters and three grandchildren before coming to Uganda."

Janice liked feeding the little babies most. She found lifting the older babies physically challenging but was a trooper and found much satisfaction in helping all she could.

They decided to spend their mornings, volunteering here at Sanyu Babies' Home. They travelled quite a long way through lots of traffic each day to get to Sanyu Babies' Home. In preparation for the trip, Uli who is only 7 and ½ years old, decided to put a big box in her school with a sign advertising that any donations could be made for her trip to Sanyu Babies' Home. She said that she was amazed at how quickly donations came in as the next day, the box was full of clothes donated by her friends at school. The clothes filled two big suitcases that were brought to Sanyu Babies' Home for the children.

While at Sanyu, Mary Anne and Uli both helped a lot with the laundry. They did lots of hanging laundry, and then folding and

sorting it when it was dry, they said the pile of laundry was endless!



Uli's favourite part of volunteering was playing with the older children and holding the little babies. Mary Anne said she liked it all as there was always so much to do. She found there were always lots of jobs, all equally important. She said she found changing and

feeding the smaller babies the most fun.

Mary Anne said that Sanyu Babies Home was a wonderful place and that she was impressed with the staff and the way they all work together to make it such a happy place. Uli said that she would definitely like to return to Uganda on a future trip with her mum and come back to Sanyu Babies Home to volunteer again!

The past seven weeks of volunteering at Sanyu Babies Home have been so special in so many ways. Sanyu is truly a place of joy, love and hope. It's crazy what the babies already had to go through in their short lives and yet they are so happy!

Even though the work at the orphanage was physically and sometimes emotionally hard, I've never felt so fulfilled in my life. When I first arrived here I was overwhelmed by the hectic atmosphere and the huge number of children (who all want to be picked up of course) but within a few days I got used to the daily routine and came to know the children and the Mamas. They're all so special in their unique ways!

The babies and the mamas gave me more than I could ever give them; they taught me so much about life. For instance, it has been inspiring watching the growth and development of little Malaika, who was born with a congenital upper limb deficiency and only has half of

her arms. She is so determined, resilient and happy, which taught me the importance of being strong and never giving up when faced with life's challenges. It has also been inspiring seeing how much love the Mamas they have for the kids and how they're so thankful for the small joys life brings. It was so much fun getting to know the Mamas and learning about the Ugandan culture, such as trying typical Ugandan food and learning Luganda words.

I love having all the kids run up to me with a smile and hug me when I go over to the orphanage in the morning and yelling: "Anna Anna banana!" That always makes my day! I also love sitting in the babies' room holding a newborn and being amazed at how tiny and perfectly formed they are. It's amazing seeing the kids learning and playing in class and watching how happy they are once they learn something new.

I'll miss the hectic evenings trying to put everyone to bed, singing songs with the kids, spinning them around and chasing them. I'll miss laying in bed at night, totally exhausted and tired but also so happy.

I'll miss everyone here, all the babies, the Mamas, the other volunteers and the staff, and I know that I'll definitely come back one day! I'm so thankful that I got to be here.
